



History - Berlin Trip

We set off at about half-four in the morning and made our way to Stansted Airport. After some brief confusion at the check-in gates we were through security and onto the duty free, whereby some of the boys went to take advantage of the free samples of 'fragrance' on offer. We landed in Berlin on time and, with only one wheel falling off a student's suitcase, made it to the hotel in one piece. We walked through the centre of Berlin to get to our first stop, walking past some very grand buildings and architecture, which impressed a number of the students.

Our first stop was the 'Palace of Tears', the security checkpoint which saw hundreds of thousands of refugees leave from the Communist East Berlin to the Democratic West. We then had a short 20-minute walk up to see the Soviet response to the exodus of its people, the Berlin Wall. The museum has a section of the Berlin wall still complete that you can walk up to and touch, as well as a museum with artefacts and contemporary video clips close by. Following this and after a very early start we got the tram back to the hotel.



Day two saw us going to Sachsenhausen, one of the earliest concentration camps built by the Nazis. The walls, gate house, watch towers and a good portion of the other buildings are still intact and in their original form, giving the place an authentic and eerie feel. The students split off and went to explore in groups. Following Sachsenhausen we got the train down the Berlin Olympic stadium, a huge arena built by Hitler for the 1936 Berlin games. We had a guided tour around the stadium with a very interesting tour guide who mixed the history of the stadium and the more

have 'been where Messi was". Finally, we set off for the house of the Wannsee conference. This conference was were it was decided that the Nazis were going to commit the Holocaust. It has now been turned into a museum. We had a talk from one of the curators and then went back to the hotel for games of pool and Shuffleboard.

On day three our first stop was the Stasi Museum. The Stasi were East Germany's secret police and their headquarters has been turned into a museum to document and tell the story of the Stasi. We had a very interesting guided tour around the museum with our guide explaining the inner workings of a total police state and showing off the James Bond-esque gadgets that they used. We then left for lunch at check-point Charlie and went to the 'Topography of Terror'. The site of the former SS headquarters to look at how the SS and Gestapo used terror to control the German population. Finally, our day ended with a guided tour around the resistance museum, which looks at all the people who tried to resist Hitler and the Nazis, as well as those who plotted to assassinate him. The students then had some free time in the Mall of Berlin until it was time to go back.



Our final day took us to the iconic Brandenburg Gate in the centre of Berlin and the nearby Memorial to the Murdered Jews of Europe. The students then had some free time to get some lunch and explore this central area of the German capital. Next was the visit to the Reichstag with access to the Reichstag Dome and roof terrace. This very impressive building allows a 360-degree view of Berlin from what feels like one of its tallest buildings. This was our final event of the trip so we made our way to the airport and travelled back without any issues. From speaking with the students it seems like they really enjoyed the trip and learned a lot.



Why do we exist? These inquiries spark critical thinking and exploration, inviting students to contemplate the deeper meaning behind their existence.



Year 9: Relationships and Family Life: Ethical Perspectives




